

My Hands are made for Doing Good

What You Need:

Copy, construction paper or cardstock; washable paint; small tissue paper squares; marker; glue

What You Do:

- Give each child a piece of paper.
- Help kids paint hands and place hand prints on the paper, whether top or bottom, leave enough room at the other end to write the memory verse.
- While paint is still wet, ask kids to tell you several ways they can do good. For each good they think of, have them place a tissue piece on the hands. As the paint dries, the tissue should stick to it. If paint dries too quickly, use a small dot of glue for tissue paper. Hopefully, their handprints will end up quite colorful.
- After hands (paint) are dry, write the memory verse either above or below hands. Whether your child can write the verse or you do, make sure to go over it several times with them while writing.
